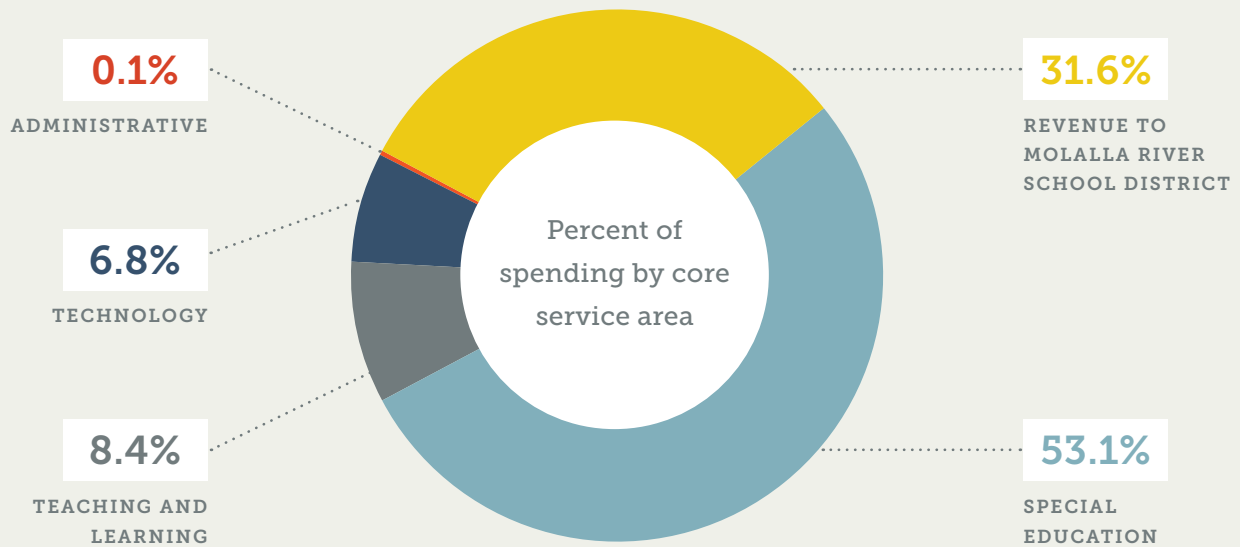

Direct revenue to districts – \$14,806,478

Provides pass-through State School Fund dollars, offering districts autonomy to select services they need. These funds often help pay for contracted services.



School-age special education services – \$10,111,988

Supports students ages 5-21 in receiving specially designed instruction and related services through the Life Enrichment Education Program.



Technology services – \$2,685,624

Funds network and information security services, Infinite Visions (the finance and human resources management system), and document/ image storage and archiving.



Teaching and learning services – \$1,370,659

Works to increase student achievement through educator professional development, consultation and group facilitation.



Administrative services – \$44,946

Supports home school registration, courier services, substitute teacher registration and the FlashAlert emergency messaging system.
